New Mexico Panorama

A Los Alamos house by Archaeo Architects is carefully integrated into its unparalleled site


ERCHED ON THE PRECIPICE OF A FINGER MESA IN LOS ALAMOS, a residence designed by Santa Fe-based Archaeo Architects offers unrivaled 270-degree views of the northern New Mexico landscape. A green carpet of eighty-foottall ponderosa pines covers the nearby canyon and transitions into brush on the flanks of adjoining sand-colored mesas. In the distance, the Sangre de Cristo Mountains rise up in the east, with the Sandia Mountains visible to the south.


The house is positioned on a circular plinth, set into the site's volcanic tufa rock, to harvest vistas from both its interior and its exterior spaces. Resembling the prow of a ship, a fifty-foot sky-walk juts out from the structure's eastern facade and overlooks the geology of the Pajarito Plateau—located on the east flank of the Jemez Mountains—on which the town was built. The landscape is marked by spectacular finger mesas separated by deep canyons where ravens periodically ride thermals. The horizontal striations of these mesas informed the scheme of the residence.

"Our design is essentially a building that tries to play off solid elements of stone," says Aaron Bohrer, who designed the house with Jon Dick. (Bohrer now runs his own firm, Archi-Scape, in Santa Fe.) The architects started with flat stone walls that recall the tops of the surrounding mesas. "The rest of the house is really a counterpoint to the solidity of the walls," continues Bohrer. "It's a structure of heavy timbers and glass; there's not much enclosure. If you were to take away the glass walls, the living room would be entirely open to the exterior except for the roof




and one wall of stone. When you're walking through this house, it feels like you're walking through a ruin."

The natural splendor and the panoramic views drew owners Steve and Ann Greene to the property. The couple had camped on the site long before the residence came to fruition, and their passion for the outdoors influenced the design: There is access to the outside from every point in the house. Gleaning inspiration from the work of Frank Lloyd Wright, Richard Neutra and Rudolph M. Schindler, Archaeo helped to realize the Greenes' vision for a permanent camp.

The question that repeatedly came up during the design process, says Dick, was "how are we going to create a house that's worthy of this view?" The firm, which blends modern archetypes with the region's vernacular architecture, decided on a structure that would be carefully integrated into its extraordinary site. Two L-shaped walls of stacked sandstone converge to define the center of the house. Like clasping hands, they intersect in the entry to form an enclosed area akin to a Roman atrium, complete with a fountain. One wall draws visitors into the house from the west, and another

leads them out to the east-oriented skywalk. The walls resemble an archaeological site around which the house was constructed.

The experience of walking between the walls creates a tangible connection with the architecture, the materials and the land. Just beyond the property line, there are ancient steps carved into the cliffs by the first native inhabitants. Bandelier National Monument, with its pueblo ruins and cliff dwellings, is also nearby.

The master bedroom on the second floor is encapsulated in standing-seam green copper. Its cubelike shape appears to float above the transom and clerestory windows of the entry. The rest of the rooms are situated on the ground floor and organized along-side the two stone walls in "a series of squares and rectangles that step around and follow the curve of the plinth," explains Dick. This layout ensures that each room has distinctive views. Deep eaves protect the interior from the high summer sun but permit sunlight to enter the house during the winter months. "It's a planar kind of aesthetic," says Dick. The structure has "planes of stone and glass that are vertical, and then it has the planes of the roofs that come sliding out well beyond the vertical walls."

There is a continual dialogue between the finished assemblage of stone, wood and glass on the interior of the house and the mesas, trees and sky in the landscape. This relationship is clearly expressed in the dining room, where floor-to-ceiling window walls recede to facilitate an indoor picnic. When these are opened, boundaries dissolve. "It's as if the architecture is dematerializing so you can be one with the view," says Dick. 4+
